
One can find delight equally fast in the creation of new friendships, and move and live and share the happiness of each other, together.



AUGUST 13, 1945 - "Feminine barbershop singing devotees of Tulsa decided that they will henceforth be known as "Sweet Adelines'. The momentous decision was made at a meeting

where members wrote suggestions for names and the reason for the decision — so many suggested 'Sweet Adelines' that the board of directors made it official.'

SEPTEMBER 16, 1945 - "To sing and have fun together is the primary purpose of this newly organized group. However, officers realize that a few rules are necessary if only to have the right to tell a sister member that she is off pitch or out of key when singing in the group or in one of the quartets. Books on organization law have been read and discussed and legal advice has been obtained, and as a result a constitution has
